

34 CFR 602.17

Enacted 7/1/10; pertaining to HEOA (2008)

- (g) Requires institutions that offer distance education or correspondence education to have processes in place through which the institution establishes that the student who registers in a distance education or correspondence education course or program is the same student who participates in and completes the course or program and receives the academic credit. The agency meets the requirement if it
 - (1) Requires institutions to verify the identity of a student who participates in class or coursework by using, at the option of the institution, such methods as
 - (i) A secure login and pass code;
 - (ii) Proctored examinations; and
 - (iii) New or other technologies and practices that are effective in verifying student identity; and
 - (2) Makes clear in writing that institutions must use processes that protect student privacy and notify students of any projected additional student charges associated with the verification of student identity at the time of registration or enrollment.







Methodology

- Mixed method data collection
- Academic and technical advisory teams
- Subject matter experts
- Literature review
- WCET, ICAI resources
- Peer & "wanna be" institution practices
- Primary research 3 surveys



Recommendations

- Strengthen infrastructure
 - Staff, liaisons, self-evaluation



- Orientation, tutorial, resources
- Increase understanding, training for faculty
 - Curriculum design, assessments, resources
- Move beyond minimal verification parameter
 - Augment log-in & password, conduct pilot





Outcomes to Date

- Strengthen infrastructure
 - Academic Integrity Program Director (DOS)
 - Associate Coordinator-Remote & Online Testing (CTL)
 - Quarterly compliance meetings (Fin Aid)





Outcomes to Date (cont)

- Increase Al awareness, education for students
 - Testing Online AI tutorial
 - 703 students assigned the course
 - 312 students as a sanction
 - DOS investigating use by all students





Outcomes to Date (cont)

- Increase understanding, training for faculty
 - DOS tracking misconduct in online courses
 - Faculty may submit online Misconduct Reports
 - eC2 enhanced online faculty orientation content
 - CTL offering faculty workshop online





Outcomes to Date (cont)

- Move beyond minimal verification parameter
 - Evaluated alternatives, conducted pilot




Online Proctoring

- Students are monitored via web cam and application sharing


ProctorU Usage Fall 2015


Total Users = 113 Total exams completed = 215












ProctorU User Satisfaction

January 25-July 6, 2016


Total number of Responses = 518 Overall Satisfaction rating = 4.26


ifteen credits were all he needed. That's what the school district in California where Adam Sambrano works as a careerguidance specialist required for a bump in pay. But when he saw the syllabus for a graduate course he'd enrolled in last year at Arizona State University, he knew he was in trouble.

Among the assignments was a 19-page paper, longer than anything he'd ever written. The idea of that much research worried Mr. Sambrano, who also spends time serving in the Army National Guard.

Before the class started, he went on Craigslist and enlisted the service of a professional cheater. For \$1,000 — less than the monthly housing allowance he was receiving through the GI Bill, he says — Mr. Sambrano hired a stranger to take his entire course.

He transferred \$500 upfront, "From Adam for ASU," according to a receipt obtained by *The Chronicle*. Then he just waited for the cheater to do his work.

On any given day, thousands of students go online seeking academic relief. They are first-years and transfers overwhelmed by the curriculum, international students with poor English skills, lazy undergrads with easy access to a credit card. They are nurses, teachers, and government workers too busy to pursue the advanced degrees they've





Specifics between periods

- Course and users report (A unique user is a new student who enrolls)
 - Summer 1+2 32 courses, 658 unique users, 6,959 vals
 - Fall YTD 34 courses, 837 unique users, 10,059 vals
 - 28% increase in unique new users in Fall YTD
- IP
 - Summer 1+2 5 countries 32 states
 - Fall YTD 5 countries 35 states
- Password resets
 - Summer 1+2 2 in 6,959 vals
 - Fall YTD- 1 in 10,059 vals
- Attendance grid shows > 10 avg. validations per student = higher use avgs than many other schools.

Next Steps

ProctorU

- Monitor usage and shift cost to district
- Explore additional online proctoring options to control costs

BioSig ID

- Scale use with courses that do not require proctored exams
- Shift cost to the district



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
