UNOH'S STORY

The institution should be able to demonstrate that it assigns credit hours to courses following *institutional policy* in a reasonable and systematic way, taking into consideration the instructional time provided to students

Federal Compliance Overview from Higher Learning Commission (HLC) website

ASSIGNMENT OF CREDIT

(1) one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester or trimester hour of credit, or ten to twelve weeks for one quarter hour of credit, or the equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time; or (2) at least an equivalent amount of work as required in paragraph (1) of this definition for other activities as established by an institution, including laboratory work, internships, practica, studio work, and other academic work leading to the award of credit hours. 34CFR 600.2 (11/1/2010) (HLC Website)

CORRESPONDENCE OR ONLINE?

The Federal Compliance filing packet notes that in order to avoid being classified as a correspondence course, online courses must have "regular and substantive interaction between the students and the instructor, synchronously or asynchronously."

•So how does this work for an online class that does NOT meet f2f??



CREDIT HOUR EQUIVALENCY

3 credit hour courses= 30 hours of *planned instructional* time

☐ 5 credit hour courses= 50 hours of *planned instructional* time

 Since there isn't "seat time" which is assumed to be instructional time, we intentionally plan for instruction in online courses.



CREDIT HOUR EQUIVALENCY

We created charts with various items that represent instructional time in a course

The result will be a completed form for each course that provides calculations for planned instructional time in each course

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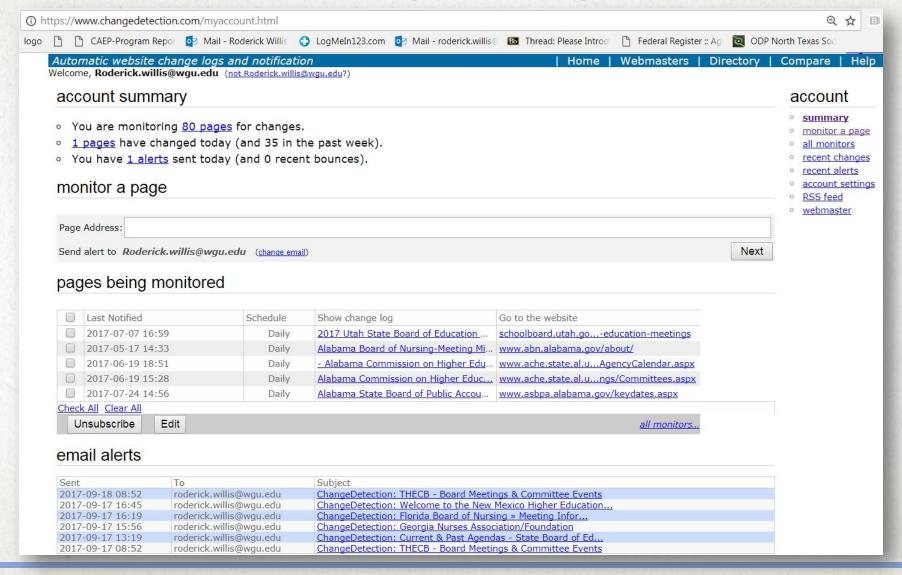

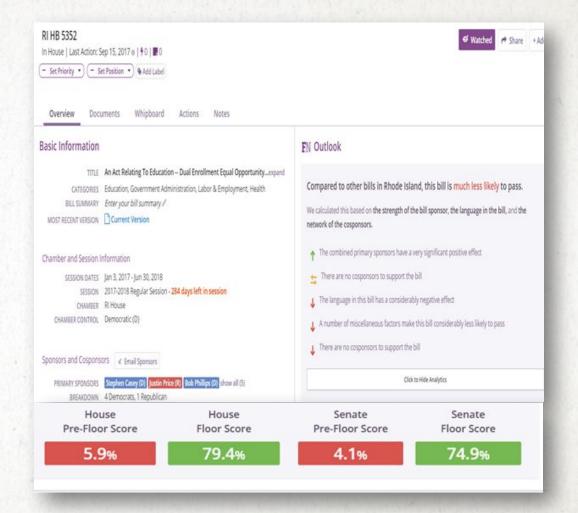
6N-1.007 Termination of an In-State Institution's Participation in Florida's reciprocity agreement.

PURPOSE AND EFFECT: To implement the requirements of chapter 2017-87, Laws of Florida, providing for Florida's participation in a reciprocity agreement with other states pertaining to the interstate delivery of postsecondary distance education.

SUMMARY: The rules will provide for process for application by qualified institutions to the Postsecondary Reciprocal Distance Education Coordinating Council, fees for those applications, the manner in which the Council shall resolve complaints related to distance education obtained under the terms of the reciprocity agreement, and termination of an institution's participation.

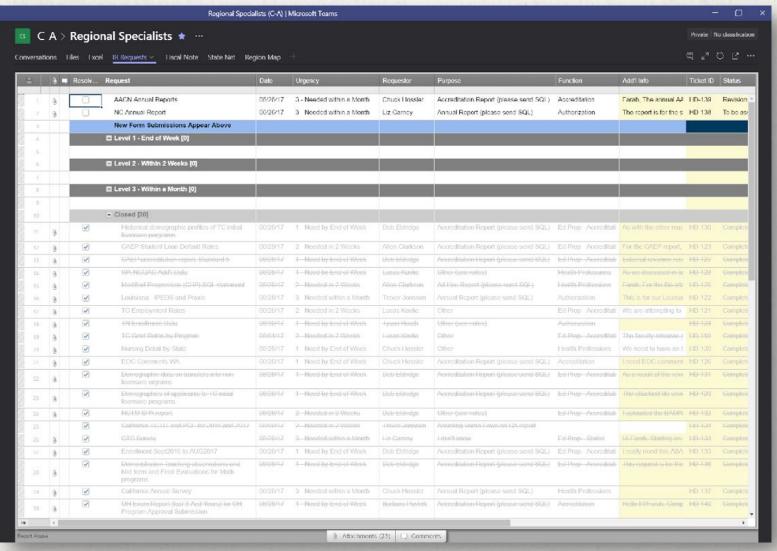
SUMMARY OF STATEMENT OF ESTIMATED REGULATORY COSTS AND LEGISLATIVE RATIFICATION:

The Agency has determined that this will not have an adverse impact on small business or likely increase directly or indirectly regulatory costs in excess of \$200,000 in the aggregate within one year after the implementation of the rule.



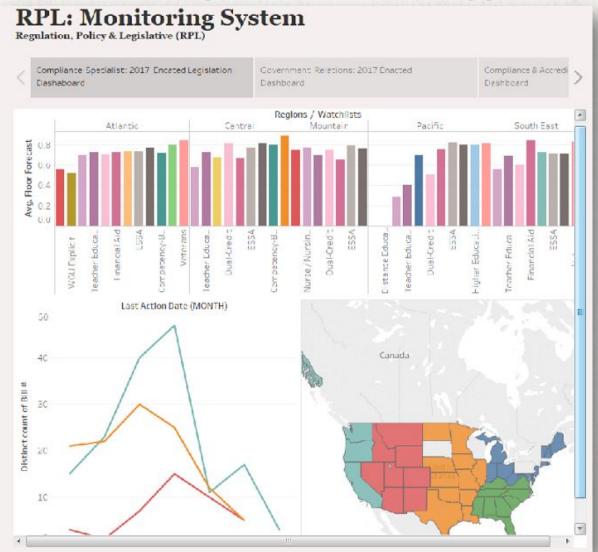

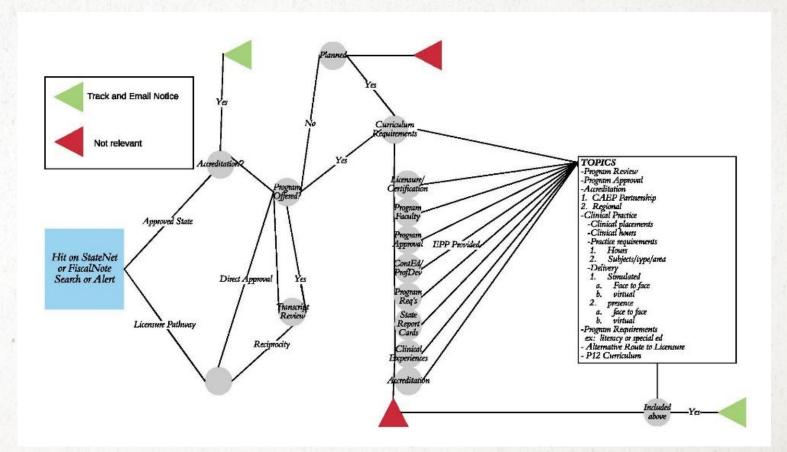

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COMPLIANCE BUY-IN: A CROSS UNIT APPROACH



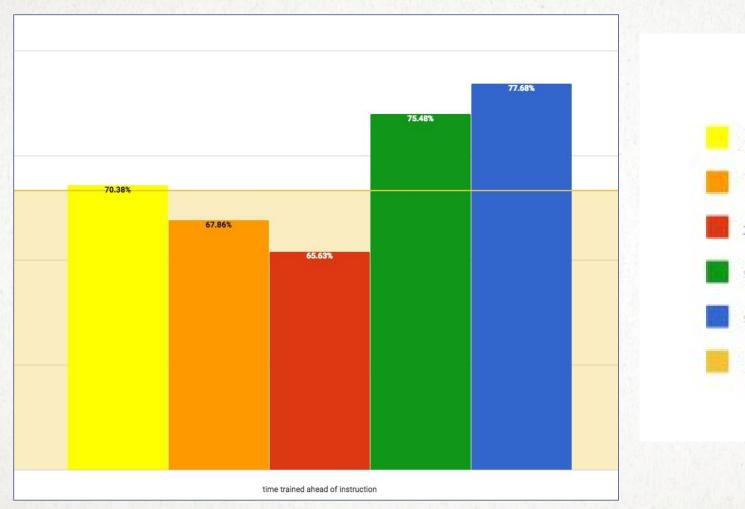
The CTL uses a cross-unit approach to get buy-in from both faculty and senior administrators through:

CTL RESEARCH AND DATA COLLECTION TOOLS

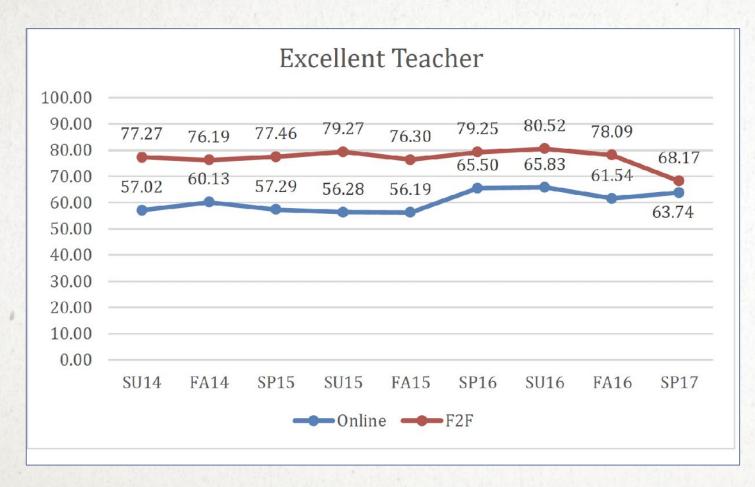
