



THREATS TO BUSINESS


- Risks to employee & public safety
- Financial cost of recovery
- Inability to fulfill customer orders
- Damaged reputation & brand
- Disrupted production schedules
- Lost productivity
- Increased insurance premiums

ECONOMIC THREATS

- Major companies want to avoid crime 'hotspots'
- Potential impact on employment & national/regional investment
- Additional pressure on police resources

The true cost of loss can be 5-7 x the value of the stolen goods. In Europe alone, one EU study^{*} estimated the cost of cargo crime to be some $\in 8.2$ billion annually.




HOW IS TAPA HELPING ITS MEMBERS TO PROTECT THEIR SUPPLY CHAINS?

CRIME INTELLIGENCE



TAPA's Incident Information Service collates loss data and crime intelligence

- The database helps TAPA members plan their supply chains based on a clearer understanding of crime 'hotspots' and the modus operandi of criminals
- Cargo crime intelligence is reported to TAPA's IIS by members, insurers and law enforcement agencies, and gathered from media sources
- IIS issues latest incident crime alerts to members
- Insurers use IIS to assess risk
- IIS produces quarterly and annual cargo crime reports to provide additional insight for its members





CERTIFIED INDUSTRY STANDARDS



Facility Security Requirements (FSR)

TAPA's Facility Security Requirements (FSR) represent minimum standards specifically for secure warehousing, or in-transit storage, within a supply chain.

- The first TAPA FSR was conducted in 2001
- FSR certifications are site/facility
- TAPA's FSR is reviewed/updated every 3 years based on current risks
- Three levels of certification:
- FSR Level A Highest security protection
- FSR Level B Mid-level security protection
 FSR Level C Lowest Security protection
- Levels A, B & C are audited by TAPA-approved Independent Audit Bodies
- Level C can also be achieved by self-certification by an in-house TAPA-trained auditor
- By end Q4/17 = 645 TAPA FSR certifications in EMEA



CERTIFIED INDUSTRY STANDARDS



Trucking Security Requirements (TSR)

TAPA's Trucking Security Requirements (TSR) focus exclusively on transport by truck and represents minimum Standards specifically for transporting products via road within a supply chain.

- TSR was launched in 2005
- TAPA's TSR is reviewed/updated every 3 years based on current risks
- Three levels of certification:
- TSR Level 1 Highest security protection
- TSR Level 2 Mid-level security protection
- TSR Level 3 Lowest level security protection
- Levels 1,2 & 3 are audited by TAPA-approved Independent Audit Bodies (IAB)
- Level 3 can also be achieved by self-certification by an in-house TAPA-trained auditor
- By end Q4/17 = 126 TAPA TSR certifications in EMEA



CERTIFIED INDUSTRY STANDARDS



Parking Security Requirements (PSR)

TAPA EMEA aims to ensure a wide choice of credible secure parking place options are available to its members and associates.

- Launched in 2018, TAPA's PSR offers a number of options and security levels to Parking Place Operators (PPO)
- PSR is available to independent PPO's and those PPO's included in other secure parking schemes
- Five levels of classification:
- PSR Level 1 Highest security protection with a formal certification
 PSR Level 2 Mid-level security protection with a formal
- certification
- PSR Level 3 Lowest security protection with a formal certification
- PSR Partnership Declaration Minimum entry level not requiring a formal certification
- PSR Mutual Recognition Agreement Formal recognition of Secure Parking Schemes designed and operated by other TAPA-approved organisations



TAPA's PSR is supported by the Association's Secure Parking Online Tool, which enables members to map cargo crime incidents on specific routings and identify TAPA PSR secure parking locations to protect high value, theft targeted loads.
